General 2022 Season Update:

The 2022 pool season is finished! I hope you enjoyed your time at the pool and see it as a valuable asset to our neighborhood. Along with the good things, there were many challenges this year. I have a growing list of suggestions for the 2023 season. If you have specific comments or suggestions for next year, please email me at Pool@woodlandshomeowners.org. I'll do my best to incorporate your ideas into changes for 2023.

<u>Baby Pool:</u> Big update here. I received lots of input from families in the neighborhood regarding the baby pool. I heard two main questions: 1.) Can we convert to a splash pad? 2.) Can we just fix the problems, so it is dependable? After reviewing splash pad options, the cost (\$70-90k) and complexity (permitting, future equipment maintenance/costs, etc) are too high to enable this change. It would not be a good stewardship of our HOA resources.

Instead, I focused on the best way to make the baby pool a dependable feature of our pool area. The Board approved an in-depth resurfacing and refinishing of the baby pool. This project is not only a repair, but also an upgrade which will greatly reduce future maintenance requirements. The work has already been completed.

Woodlands HOA Rewrite of Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions A Message from the Vice President


Overview

Over the past few years of being on the HOA Board, I have noticed that one of the most common questions that come from homeowners is around what rules and requirements exist within our current Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions, and Plat Restrictions for the Woodlands HOA.

Some of the questions or requests to the HOA Board ask that we either put various restrictions and requirements on current members, or to prevent action from a current or future homeowner. For example, demand that a member maintain their property (yard and lawn), require HOA approval to install a fence or shed, require architectural review/approval for property improvements or construction, and limit the number of homes that can be purchased and used as a rental property. Having various restrictions like these in HOA Covenants has become almost a standard for newer neighborhoods.

While these types of requirements are much more standard for new neighborhoods, the existing Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions that govern the Woodlands HOA were written and approved many years ago with limited restrictions that provide great flexibility and independence to our members. Undertaking an effort to rewrite our legal documents to include some of these standard restrictions has been a Board item reviewed each and every year. Based on many factors, the Board has consistently voted to not pursue rewriting our Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions.

Since this is a frequently asked topic, I thought we would create an opportunity for members who are interested to join a few Board members to talk about our current covenants and restrictions, what the effort involves, cost, and requirements involved to complete a re-write. On November 3rd at 7:00pm at the Clubhouse, we will host an open discussion on the Woodlands HOA Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions, the cost/effort, and timeline to update. Look forward to talking with anyone interested.
